From the Alfrick & Lulsley Parish Council Meeting 27 February 2020

Planning and Environmental Matters:

Jubilee Spinney: Access paths are now mostly covered in mulch/wood chippings provided by Nick Denley. This has helped a lot with soaking up the lying water, but more applications are needed. Digging up brambles, saplings and unwanted scrub is going well so the space now looks well cleared. The creation/design of a perimeter path has started, to be covered in mulch and with planting of snowdrops, but this really needs to be done when they have died down. Promises of more snowdrops, small native-like daffodils and primroses have been received.

Next jobs: ivy to be cut at pollard height or at a minimum of head height on the tall trees; more bramble root, ash sapling clearance. There is an increasing number of enthusiastic working party volunteers to whom many thanks.

It was agreed to go ahead with the previously discussed and agreed fence and gate into the adjacent field.

Alfrick Pound: Good progress has been made clearing unwanted scrub and digging up dogwood roots; the snowdrops are free from scrub and are flowering. More working parties are needed for more clearance and digging. There was a good number of volunteers for the last working party and their efforts are greatly appreciated.

More people are volunteering to help with both of these working parties and they are now seeing the results of the work.

Committee on New Public Facilities: A discussion on the costs, locations and timings of projects resolved into a view that a preference was for a Multi-Games Area (MUGA) containing an LTA approved-size tennis court. Discussions on its best site are still taking place. A Children's Play Area would then take over the existing Tennis Court space. The MUGA and Play Area projects are possible for completion over the autumn/ winter of 2020-21.

Celebrating VE Day 75th Anniversary:

Friday 8 May 2020 has been designated by the Government as a Bank Holiday, with licensing hours extended to enable parishes, along with individuals, voluntary organisations, pubs, restaurants and hotels etc., to join in the celebrations over the VE Day weekend of **8-10 May 2020**. Residents' suggestions are requested.

Highways and Footpaths: War Memorial surrounds. A WCC Highways engineer had visited and concluded the over-running of the boundary curbstones was not sufficient to justify their costs, but could be considered if the parish would meet them. A detailed quotation has now been requested.

Forty Years On -- Garth Lowe

It was in the early eighties that we were offered the post of wardens of the *Knapp and Papermill Reserve*, exchanging homes with Mr. and Mrs Doncaster, who had made a generous gift of the house and land to the Trust. Their gift and the further addition of old meadows and woodland has ensured that this lovely part of the Leigh Brook valley will stay unchanged for the foreseeable future.

Although the landscape is unaltered, the flora and fauna have mainly changed, for the worse unfortunately. Some plants like wood sorrel and butterfly orchid seem to have gone, but the addition of transplanted green winged orchids proved a success in Big Meadow, which also now has marsh orchids that arrived on their own a few years ago. During my stay I also started the butterfly monitoring, which still continues on a weekly basis from April to September and this has shown up a general decline in sightings even though the management has altered very little. Gone now are the small heath, and the dingy skipper looks likely to follow it. Marbled whites, silver washed fritillary and white admiral do appear to be doing better though, and the latter is a lovely butterfly to look for in the first two

weeks of July. With birds it is the dipper that is sorely missed, now the quality of the stream has dropped slightly, and there is not enough life in the stream to sustain a breeding pair. In 2019 a pair nested in the northern section, but just one chick hatched from four eggs!

Thank goodness there are enough fish to keep our resident pair of kingfishers; elusive, but seen more often in May and July while feeding their young. The arrival of pied flycatchers was good news; they are noted in my nest records for 1983 with 1999 their last year until 2009, and then in 2019 when a pair nested on Trust woodland near my bungalow.

On a final note, technology has also finally caught up in the reserve and there is now a solar panel providing energy to pump water into a trough for the occasional winter grazing stock, necessary to keep the grassland in order. Unfortunately a few things were overlooked namely the water level in the well drops at the end of summer, and in cold weather the trough has frozen solid so the cattle have to use the brook again. The derelict cottage in Papermill Meadow now has new tenants. It has been adopted as a summer roost for a colony of lesser horseshoe bats.
