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From Rev Anne.....

We continue to live with constant changes of rules around services, especially weddings and funerals, and so we are not organising services in advance as we recognise we may all be back in lockdown any day. At the time of writing there will be a Harvest celebration in each church. We are currently thinking about each Parish's *Act of Remembrance* in November. As for Christmas I think this year we will not be able to have the *Barnyard Nativity*, as we have known it, or large carol services – but watch this space for what we can do to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ, the cornerstone of our Christian faith.

Now... instead of hearing from me this month I thought you would like to hear from the, not so new now as he was ordained in January, Bishop of Dudley, Rt Rev Martin Gorick:



"2020 has been such a strange year. Autumn has arrived, yet in some ways the year never seems to have got started. I feel I am still living with so many uncertainties, and trying to make plans on the constantly shifting sands of guidance and advice based on ever evolving Covid realities. We are all learners in this, and pioneers too as we discover new ways of being church. Tiredness and fatigue are very natural too and sometimes the weight of it all can press very heavily. I'm so encouraged by the prayerful determination in our churches to be people of hope, even in the darkest times.

Traditionally we celebrate Harvest at this time. It's been a tough year for farmers, with heat-waves, droughts and floods. Sowing seed in a wet winter was almost impossible, and many grain harvests have been poor. Nevertheless lorries and trailers filled with bales of straw and hay are testimony to the resilience and grit of our farmers, who just had to 'carry on carrying on', pandemic or not. I salute all those who work on the land, who produce our food and tend our environment. Brexit will affect them all, though it's still not clear how. They deserve our traditional harvest thanks and prayers.

We give thanks too for the harvest of Kingdom Values that have been so evident in parishes up and down our diocese this year, for every glimpse of love, every act of compassion, every shout for justice and every step into freedom.

May the Lord of the world, the Lord of the harvest, bless you and keep you. One God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen."

Our District Councillors' "View from the Hills"

As I write, COVID cases are increasing steeply, though the same is not true of deaths and – it seems – serious illnesses. Malvern Hills figures are in line with those nationally, but consistently at much lower levels and by far the lowest in Worcestershire. Touch wood that they stay that way.



Despite COVID, there is never a shortage of schemes from our masters in London. Last month we advised you of Westminster's draft proposals to alter planning law, removing most local input to development. This month's proposal is to remove a layer of local government by creating "unitary authorities", as in Herefordshire.

This is superficially attractive: who isn't in favour of fewer bureaucrats? The problem lies in how you form a new authority and how local interests are represented, not to mention how high council tax creeps when local representation is minimised. We believe firmly that local government should remain just that: local.

On a happier note, additional funds have been made available (locally!) for fibre broadband schemes. We hope these will help the schemes at Crews Hill, Longley Green and Lulsley, though *Openreach* remain an obstacle to be circumvented.

The shop community of volunteers is most grateful for all she did for the café, even helping us to gain a muchcoveted place in the Regional Finals of the Rural Oscars for best shop/café enterprise (on hold for this year due to Covid). We all desperately want to see the café buzzing again as the social hub at the heart of the village,

From the Alfrick & Lulsley Parish Council Meeting 24 September by Zoom

Formal Co-option:

To fill the vacancy on the council caused by the resignation of Ms B Brown, the council heard brief presentations from two candidates and – the applicants having left the meeting – the council discussed whom to co-opt. The general view was that both candidates offered interesting and useful contributions and there was a substantial discussion before the Chair called for a vote following which Mr G Messervy-Whiting was confirmed as the successful candidate.

Planning and Environmental Matters:

 It was agreed to support the application at Hop Pickers Cottage, Lulsley, for the construction of a double garage and stables with storage.

 There was concern about an application for an all weather riding ménage at Clay Green Farm as it seems to relate to a built structure which does not have planning permission. Furthermore the access to the site will be via the road through the proposed development at Clay Green Farm, and it is doubtful this would be adequate. Also there is no reference in the application to effluent run off and no ecological information has been provided.

New Public Facilities

The Parish Council is planning the following developments:

• Alter the current tennis court to become a Multi Use Games Area, (MUGA), with marked courts for Tennis, Five aside football and Basketball. It will be run by a new group for use by villagers (subject to a membership fee) and also could be booked by outside groups subject to rent.

- A Toddlers' Play Area to be built on the playing field alongside the existing picnic tables.
- A footpath to be laid around the perimeter of the playing field to encourage all of us to take exercise. The idea of the footpath is that for the less able and younger ones there would be a place where they could walk that is flat and surfaced, and which can be used all year.
- Outdoor exercise equipment to encourage all to get fitter. This will be once we have conducted a fundraising effort.

We shall be circulating details to all residents as this is the best way to let everyone know what is happening in this time of restrictions due to the pandemic.

A History of Harvests, etc.

The month of October starts with Harvest and ends with Halloween (All Hallows' Eve) – the start of two days of celebrating the lives of those who have gone before us – All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day.

Harvest Festival is often celebrated in the Church on the first Sunday of October. The festival, as it is known today, is attributed to Rev Robert Hawker who, in 1843, invited parishioners to a special thanksgiving service in Morwenstow, Cornwall.

In reality, of course, harvest celebrations date back about 3,500 years to Old Testament days when God gave Moses instructions for seven annual feasts (*Leviticus 23*). These included three harvests: *First fruits* in spring for the barley harvest; *Weeks* in early summer for the wheat harvest; and *Tabernacles*, or the ingathering, in the autumn when thanks were given for all the year's crops and prayers offered for the coming year.

As well as wheat and barley, the other main crops were grapes, figs, dates, olives, and pomegranates. These seven foods are sometimes called the *Seven Species* of the Bible. They are those God told the Israelites they would enjoy when they arrived in the Promised Land. (*Deuteronomy 8:8*) In Rev Hawker's days most of the UK population relied totally on growing their food locally and a good harvest was vital for their wellbeing throughout the coming



year. It is easy to see how his idea for a great festival rapidly established itself as a tradition. Today, few people in the UK rely on their own home-grown food or source it entirely from within their communities, so the underlying nature of Harvest Festival has changed significantly.

Not so long ago, locally grown food was taken to church at Harvest Festival, thanks given to God, and then the food was distributed to the needy in the parish. But times have changed. Nowadays, some people still take home grown food to church, but after the service, the donations are often forwarded to a food bank. Usually, in Alfrick there is the traditional Harvest Supper and Auction, cancelled this year because of Covid-19 precautions. So in 2020 we shall miss the hearty homemade casserole followed by tasty apple or fruit pies accompanied by a glass of wine (or two). The auction would regularly raise over £300 and be followed by lusty singing of two traditional harvest hymns. Those were the days; let's hope and pray they return in 2021!

We open <u>UP</u> a shop in the morning, but we close it <u>UP</u> at night. We seem to be pretty mixed <u>UP</u> about <u>UP</u>! To be knowledgeable about the proper uses of <u>UP</u>, look <u>UP</u> the word <u>UP</u> in the dictionary. In a desk-sized dictionary, it takes <u>UP</u> almost a quarter of the page and can add <u>UP</u> to about thirty definitions.

If you are <u>UP</u> to it, you might try building <u>UP</u> a list of the many ways <u>UP</u> is used. It will take <u>UP</u> a lot of your time, but if you don't give <u>UP</u>, you may wind <u>UP</u> with a hundred or more.

Saint Edburga (Eadburgh of Winchester)

Edburga was a Saxon princess, grand-daughter of Alfred the Great, and daughter of Edward the Elder (who was King of Wessex from 900 - 924 A.D.) and his third wife, Eadgifu. She was educated at the Abbey of St. Mary at Winchester (Nunnaminster) which was founded by her father. She remained there as a Nun, renowned for her humility and gentleness, and after she died aged 40 years, a religious cult became established celebrating her sanctity, at the Abbeys of Winchester and Wessex. When Pershore Abbey was refounded in 972 A.D. Saint Edburga's relics were obtained from Winchester and a chapel was dedicated in her name by the Benedictine monks at Pershore Abbey. The Manor of Leigh was at that time under the authority of the Abbots of Pershore so the Parish Church was also dedicated to St Edburga. Her Feast Day is June 15th.

Covid 19 has changed scouting – a bit



We have only been meeting for a few weeks now, but there are noticeable changes to the way we interact with each other. Gone are the two or three girls rushing in, hugging and then going to a corner to whisper and laugh

about something that happened at school. No longer do several boys tackle each other to gain possession of a football and fall to the floor laughing. Instead the scouts patiently and quietly wait to register and have their temperature taken; they then walk down to the field, sanitise their hands and then sit on seats spaced two metres apart. We have flag break, spaced two metres apart, we remind everyone about distances and cleanliness and we are forever watching to make sure everyone is safe – BUT...

We still have fun, the scouts light individual fires while calling advice to each other and laughing when someone fails on the first attempt. We play games that require distance and communication; we have started badge work, adapting requirements to suit team work when the team work is at a distance. One of the scouts, Jack Sandy, has even completed his Chief Scouts Award (the highest award for a scout) during lockdown.

We have even had an overnight camp! – Socially distanced with the scouts sleeping in individual tents/bivi's, a 32 page risk assessment and do-it-yourself meals, but a camp none the less – I have been camping as a cub/scout/venture/leader for 44 years now and I couldn't miss a year just because of a pandemic!!!!

This September we should have been celebrating 50 years as a scout group with a party and group activities. Covid 19 has stopped that for the minute, but we can still remember past highlights, leaders and scouts no longer with us, and all of the camps and activities we have attended and enjoyed. From The Trustees of the Leigh and Bransford Memorial Hall

TWO STEPS FORWARD BUT ONE STEP BACK So, just when we were beginning to think it might be safe to 'get back in the water', we find those Covid-19 sharks are starting to circle again menacingly. As the daily infection rate started to rise again in early September prompting fears of a 'second wave', the government introduced the so-called, legally enforceable, 'Rule of 6' in the attempt to halt the spread of the virus – short of imposing a return to the full lockdown.

HOW THE RULE OF 6 MAY AFFECT FUTURE HIRES AT THE HALL The trustees decided to reopen the Hall for hires in August – after first making sure that the building was 'Covid-secure' and by following all the latest (and updated) guidelines. By introducing additional Covid-19 Terms and Conditions of Hire we were able to welcome and host a few new groups and events over the last couple of months – but the new *Rule of 6* now introduces further restrictions on the hire of your Hall. Put simply, from the 14 September the number of people who don't live together, but may wish to meet and socialise in groups, is limited to 6 - as long as appropriate social distancing is maintained. There are, however, *a few exceptions* that may allow community venues like your Hall to continue to accept hires *for groups up to 30 people.*

Until further notice you may apply to hire the hall if your group event is: for work, and voluntary or charitable services, for education, training, registered childcare, or providers offering before or afterschool clubs for children, to organise and/or participate in children's playgroups, for wedding and civil partnership ceremonies and receptions, or for other religious life-cycle ceremonies, funerals/wakes, organised indoor and outdoor sports, physical activity and exercise classes or youth groups or activities.

But please remember that for any event included in the above list, the total number of attendees (including the hirer(s) and any children) may not exceed 30 people.

Sadly, for the time being, it will no longer be possible to hire the hall for other family (or non-family) gatherings such as a child's birthday party, family anniversary, recreational or community clubs, groups or organisations (other than for educational, training, sports, fitness or exercise classes) unless, of course, no more than 6 people attend. However, if you are considering hiring the hall for a future event for up to 30 people, but unsure whether it complies with one or more of the above list of exceptions, please contact us at <u>leighandbransfordhall@hotmail.co.uk</u> where we'll be happy to help and advise.

Finally, I want to thank our Hall trustees who continue to work hard on your behalf during these difficult times to keep the Hall and its grounds well maintained, safe, viable and Covid-secure. We look forward to the time when we can welcome all of you back once more to share more widely our valuable community resource.

The History of the Organs of St Edburga, Leigh

The earliest record of a substantial organ in St Edburga Leigh is of a three manual organ built by Nicholson of Worcester sometime before1889. Before this the singing could have been led by a barrel organ or by a group of instrumentalists. The organ was situated immediately opposite the present organ in the area from which the choir sang. It was a substantial organ, very similar to the organ in Christ Church in Malvern, built at very nearly the same time, and the organ at St. Peter's Cowleigh, built in 1868. This organ gave good service until the late 1960s when an infestation of wood boring beetle and dry rot discovered in the roof timbers was found to have spread into the woodwork of the organ immediately underneath. This meant the organ had to be removed to clear the infection in the roof; such was the damage to the woodwork of the organ that the cost of repair, together with the cost of repairing the roof, was more than the church could afford.

Nicholsons made it known that there was an organ available which might offer a possible solution. At the time the company was working on the organ at Edmundsbury Cathedral, Suffolk, during which time they had installed a makeshift organ. This organ had been removed from Quinton Methodist Church, College Road, South Birmingham, which closed in 1968 and demolished soon after closure. Being a large building it had required a loud organ, Nicholsons seem to have fitted this organ straight into St Edmundsbury Cathedral, considering its volume adequate. A quotation from Anglican Daily Times, 4 October 1967: "Although it only has 11 stops, the organ has no difficulty filling the cathedral with a rich sound." The organ was moved to St Edburga, Leigh and installed in 1973 at a cost of £2,450.00. In order to fit this into St Edburga, Nicholson fitted electric action so the organ could be placed where the present organ is situated and away from the repaired roof. The fitting of electric action meant that the console could be placed in a position which allowed the organist to follow the services better. Anecdotal evidence suggests the organ was rather loud, (it did come from a large Cathedral!) and somewhat monotonous, (it had few stops, mostly loud). This organ gave reliable service, but was apparently criticised for being too loud. With smaller congregations, it was difficult to play at a suitable volume and for quieter moments during any service only two stops were really suitable, the swell viola and the great stopped diapason.

A suggestion was made that perhaps it would be possible to find and install a more suitable organ. The "available" organ was stored in the Bishop's Palace at Hartlebury. It had been removed from St Nicholas Church in Worcester when that Church was made redundant in 1989. It was said to contain two stops by Samuel Green, a well known organ builder in his day. His organs are considered to be well worth preserving now. It sounded mild and pleasant compared with the previous organ.

The story continues.

News from Suckley Parish Council Meeting held 14 September by Zoom

COUNTY COUNCILLOR - Co Cllr Paul Tuthill reported to the meeting: Covid numbers had increased in the county, but Worcestershire had a much lower rate of cases than many other parts of the country; Fire Service performance was ahead of expectations. The new cycling and walking bridge was now in place across Hams Way, but approach routes remained to be completed. The A4440 causeway had yet to be completed and was behind schedule. As a result of February's flooding around Powick, proposals were in hand to raise approach roads to the bypass roundabout.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR - Dist Cllr Sarah Rouse reported to the meeting. She noted that in the midst of the pandemic, Central Government had tabled proposals to re-organise County and District Councils, and changes to planning law that would impose greatly increased house building figures on all Councils nationwide. Within MHDC's area, Covid cases remained low. MHDC continued to support neighbour schemes and would be focussing on rebuilding communities and helping those affected by the end of the furlough scheme.

VAS SPEEDING STATS - VAS stats for May – July 2020 revealed that 42.9% of journeys in the Parish during this time were <u>above the speed limit</u>, with one speed in the evening of 29 June being recorded at Bruff Bank at over 70 mph!

COMMUNITY – **Superfast Broadband** – Cllr P Whatley reported that Worcs Co Council had introduced an enhanced voucher scheme from 12 September, intended to reduce the costs of schemes to householders and businesses. Both Crews Hill and Longley Green schemes were stymied due to failures by *Openreach* to provide accurate, timely quotations and – out of the blue – a requirement for organisers to create legal entities with which *Openreach* would enter into contract. Cllr Whatley had consulted with the Hanley Castle Scheme's leaders and established that the contract type accepted by *Openreach* added no value or protection to them, but would impose a cost on the community. He intended to liaise with interested residents and Alfrick PC regarding their scheme in Lulsley.

PLAYING FIELD - Cllr P Whatley reported that the Playing Fields were now secure, although the play area was still being used (**despite signs stating it was closed and it still is**). The All Weather pitch was being used regularly and an enquiry had been made from Bromyard re using the football area when it becomes available. Cllr C Luton reported (via the Clerk) that she had put up new Covid signs (these have now disappeared). The steel door grid would be arriving this week and hopefully would be fitted soon after.

COVID Corner Look after Grandma and Grandad

I write this the day two related pieces of news were published, one that everyone knows about, the other that may have gone under the radar, but the two are very closely related, and indeed the findings in the second piece of news are largely the reason for the first.

The first news is that it is now illegal to socialise in groups of more than six, "The Rule of Six". So, if you are a family if 5 you can only socialise with one grandparent at a time. Seemingly illogical, but of course the thinking is the KISS principle "Keep it Simple......"; simple rules are more likely to be followed. This principle worked last time, when we were asked to "Stay at home, Protect the NHS, Save lives". Of course, there are going to be ridiculous anomalies which will be widely publicised, but it seems that across the whole population we need simple rules if they are going to work.

Back to the second piece of news. This is the paper from Sir David Spiegelhalter's group in Cambridge about the risk of dying from Covid-19 as we get older.

The most important point that shouts out from this paper is that there is an absolutely steady increase in death from Covid 19 as we get older, and the frightening thing is that the rate of death from Covid-19 doubles every 5 to 6 years of age from youth upwards.

What does this mean in numbers? Well compared to someone aged 15 to 24, the risk of dying from Covid 19 is 262 times higher age 65 to 74, 976 times higher age 75 to 84, 2,353 times higher age 85 to 90, and 4,322 times higher over the age of 90. This is why it is so important to reduce the spread of this disease among the young in the first place, and the subsequent transmission from young to old. Evidence clearly shows the progression of Covid-19 with the initial rise in the young, and then spreading to increasingly older age groups. Because the elderly simply must not catch this virus it is important to reduce the risk of transmission from young to



old. When I was at work, every year I found that there was a rise in respiratory infections in the elderly and vulnerable just after Christmas following social gatherings indoors with children and grandchildren.

Two months ago I wrote about the importance of staying two metres apart "Space"; last month about the importance of wearing masks "Face" when mixing with anyone outside our household group. Those things are important. The problem is that when socialising indoors neither "Space" nor "Face" rules are followed, and thus this new "Rule of Six" to reduce the spread of Covid-19.

However, do not rely on face shields (which are being widely advertised and we are beginning to see so many people wear) to protect others. They were designed to be used in **conjunction** with masks to protect the eyes and face of the wearer from particles, not to be used on their own. The image below shows that expired air can spread to others even when wearing a face shield.
