I thought I'd share this article written for Parish Magazines by our Archdeacon the Venerable Robert Jones.

I'll be back next month.....*Rev Anne*

"An article in the *Church Times* took me back to a hymn I'd not sung for many a year with its wonderful opening line, 'O Love that wilt not let me go'. This is the only sort of love which really counts; it's the one we recognise in our own loved ones, in parents who loved us into life, in friends who mean the world to us - and, of course, in the God revealed in Jesus Christ.

It is one year ago that we first went into lockdown. Perhaps you can recall what you were doing then when life was more 'normal'. I can remember going for drinks with neighbours the weekend before it all happened, when Covid seemed something quite distant. Now there are few of us who have not been affected personally one way or another. We know people with Covid, we know people who have died from Covid, and all of us are living with the consequences of Covid.

Lent takes us back to Jesus' forty days and nights in the desert. It seems to me that we are living our own wilderness experience in a way we could never have imagined. For Jesus this was a time of struggle: as the 23rd Psalm puts it, he walked through the valley of the shadow of death. Yet he was held in a love which would not let him go, and emerged from it to a ministry which was to turn the world upside down in faith, hope and love.

Whatever else is lacking during this time of wilderness, one thing not absent is loving kindness. We've seen it in NHS workers, teachers, neighbours and many others. In practical down-to-earth ways we have seen and experienced living examples of 'love that wilt not let me go'.

George Matheson, who wrote the hymn, had his own wilderness experience. 'Something happened to me, which was known only to myself, and which caused me the most severe mental suffering. The hymn was the fruit of that suffering,' he says, and then he wrote these beautiful lines:

'I trace the rainbow through the rain,
and feel the promise is not vain
that morn shall tearless be.'



Tracing the rainbow through the rain. Isn't this God's tenacious love for us, stronger than we can imagine, mirrored by our human experiences of being loved? We've surely had plenty of rain lately, but, you know, I've seen the odd rainbow too - hold on to such precious glimpses of glory in times as these."





The Sphere Magazine, Report on 2020



Inevitably, the magazine was affected by the coronavirus pandemic, which significantly interrupted production for the first time in its 37 year history. Only the February and March editions ran as normal with production of the April (Easter) 2020 edition completed just as all churches in the country were closed preventing further production in the vestry of Alfrick Church. Little were we to know that this would be the last printed edition until Christmas 2020 when the joint December/January 2021 edition was professionally produced for us by *Aspect Design* in Malvern. This was a special treat not only for our readers, but also for our small team of dedicated volunteers who have continued to produce monthly online editions.

These were produced and uploaded thanks to parish webmasters so those with internet access could read them (with colour photographs and fonts). Online visits have now grown to over 500 views and downloads per month. A survey was carried out to establish how many subscribers would like to receive their copies by email, but the response was limited by its patchy distribution. However, about 160 subscribers (out of around 750) were content to receive it this way, including some who would want hard copies when they are resumed. We appreciate however that many of our loyal subscribers do not have the facilities or the ability/inclination to follow the internet route and of course many subscribers prefer to have a hard copy at hand to refer to (especially for events – when these can take place – and for advertisements).

The Sphere editorial team continued to be led by Geoff Wright who edits the General and Leigh and Bransford sections, plus masterminding the printing process. I have continued to edit the Alfrick/Lulsley and Suckley sections, plus having an increasing involvement with production and distribution of the online editions. We are also very grateful to Mrs Margaret Newitt of Alfrick who continued to produce the *Younger Generation* page for the hard copy editions.

Biddy Hood's stalwart service as our treasurer is as always much appreciated. Mrs Brenda Collins, who coordinated the collation and distribution of hard copies, for which we have been most grateful, decided it was time to retire

after long service. However, since production of our own hard copies has ceased, collation has now ended, and with the planned move to professionally printed copies (albeit in grey scale owing to the otherwise high cost) the collation team will also be able to stand down. We thank them all for their considerable work over the years. John Burton has continued with the coordination of distribution in Suckley, but John Colley has now stepped back from distribution around Leigh Sinton after many years and we thank him for his considerable efforts. Our dedicated distributors collected as many of the annual subscriptions as they could at the beginning of 2020. They delivered hard copies when they were produced and we very much recognise their loyal work which will still be needed to enable printed copies to be delivered safely. Daphne and I have continued to manage the advertising with nearly 100 advertisers. There is presently a waiting list for spaces to become available, and we attempt to limit adverts to local businesses and ask our readers please to support them (and to mention *The Sphere* when making contact). Since lockdown we have not been charging advertisers, which has been much appreciated, as we were uncertain how many readers would be able to access online editions. As a result revenue has been significantly reduced, and even though our production costs were lower, this has meant that this year *The Sphere* has had less than usual to donate to our local churches and regular charities.

The magazine aims to provide as much information as possible about local events and church services/activities, and gives contact information for local groups and *The Sphere* team. Please help us to keep this information up to date. We always much appreciate receiving articles of local interest to our readers, and continue to be most grateful to all of our contributors and subscribers. New contributors and subscribers are always most welcome, just contact one of *The Sphere* team listed on the front inside cover.

As no doubt we all are, we look forward to a more hopeful and positive 2021.

Mothering Sunday: the fourth Sunday in Lent (14 March 2021)

Traditionally it is a day when we thank God for the love of our mothers, and we thank them in person for their care for us. In the UK, the service dates back hundreds of years to the time when people were encouraged once a year, on Laetare (Latin: *to Rejoice*) Sunday, to return to their home or 'mother' church or cathedral.

In 2021, *The Children's Society* is asking churches to help them fight for hope for children and young people on Mothering Sunday, when we think about and thank all those who care for us.

The coronavirus pandemic has affected all our lives, but it has hit vulnerable children and young people particularly hard. They have had months out of school, hidden from view and often without access to online learning resources. Lockdown has trapped some children at home with people who hurt and abuse them, and our research shows lockdown has also made some children more vulnerable to criminal exploitation and online grooming. As their mental health and well-being suffers, many children are losing hope.

Over the last 15 years, *The Children's Society* has studied and reported on children's well-being. And each year they have seen a consistent decline, which has only worsened as a result of the pandemic. The charity has launched its ambitious goal of overturning that decline by 2030. The theme of their Mothering Sunday resource is '**Fighting for hope**'. The charity fights for hope by

February already: where does the time go? We do hope that despite lockdown and the imperfect weather you are in good health, both physically and mentally. If you need help, it is readily available, both from us and dedicated groups like the *Here2Help* staff. They can assist with many common problems, COVID-induced or otherwise. Despite floods and ice, council activities have continued. We are now in the never easy process of determining MHDC council tax for next year. With regret, we do propose an increase to keep the books balanced for the next 5 years, though only of £5.00 per year for an average household (under 10p per week!). We believe this compares quite well to the £15.00 increase from the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) and £18.00 or so by the County Council.

Elections to the County Council and for the PCCs are scheduled for May. We have several concerns about this, due to restrictions on campaigning that clearly favour those parties with deep pockets, plus your ability to vote. It seems likely that voting will take place while COVID restrictions still apply. We believe it is vital you keep your chance to vote. If you have any concerns about going to a polling station, please apply for a postal vote. You can get the form online (just Google "postal vote") or post a stamped, addressed envelope to one of us and we will send you a form by return. We can both be reached by post via: The Council House, Avenue Rd, Malvern, WR14 3AF0.

Alyssa (not her real name) grew up in a home where there was violence, and that affected her mental health. Then she started getting bullied at school too. At one point Alyssa felt that she was completely overwhelmed, like she was 'drowning'. Unfortunately school didn't offer her the support she needed. She says: 'in my life before *The Children's Society*, I wouldn't even consider it a life. I would try and stay in the house as much as possible. I'd refuse to go to school, or I would pretend to be sick so I wouldn't have to go, and it wasn't healthy.' Eventually, Alyssa came to one of *The Children's Society's* projects and received counselling, which gave her the strength and tools to get better. Today she says: 'I probably would be dead by now without *The Children's Society* and I've noticed such a big change in myself. It brought back the Alyssa that I knew, that I love and that everyone else around me seems to love, but I guess she got lost on the way before that. I don't know what I would have done without *The Children's Society* and I'm very grateful for everything they've done for me.' Alyssa found a community of care through *The Children's Society*, and the care and help she received has enabled her to move forward in life and to reach her full potential.





Leigh and Bransford Memorial Hall

This month it's the turn of another of our trustees, **Stephen Seymour** to send in a piece for *The Sphere*. Here is what he calls

THE SAGA OF THE HALL ROOF REPAIR

There is an area of flat roofing over part of the kitchen and foyer covered with roofing felt which had deteriorated over the years and leaks were showing on the ceiling inside. The repair work was put out to tender and local company *AES Roofing* was duly chosen. Work commenced on the 12 January. So far, so good – however on stripping away the old roof the workers found 8cm thick rotting straw board between the roof joists. Obviously this had to be removed and then replaced with fibreglass insulation before the re-boarding and re-felting work could start. By Friday the re-boarding was completed and the old roof debris taken away – the exposed roof area was then covered with thick polythene sheeting for the weekend. That same Friday night, the early stages of what was later named *Storm Christoph* blew in and deposited 7mm of rain onto the polythene sheeting. When our caretaker, **George Thomas** called by on Saturday morning for his routine check of the building on he was greeted with a significant ingress of water that had both damaged the internal ceilings and flooded the foyer and kitchen floors. He mopped out, suspecting that the fierce winds of the night before had lifted the sheeting in places. He phoned me and I joined him at the hall where a more thorough inspection of the roof area confirmed his suspicions. This flat part of the roof has three pitched roof areas feeding on to it and I so immediately phoned the contractors with the bad news. It was very unfortunate timing with the storm breaking at that stage of the repair, but *AES Roofing* accepted full responsibility and agreed to cover the cost of replacing the sodden internal plasterboard, skimming and redecorating. But we were not out of the woods yet. Work on fitting the new felt started after the weekend, but then another problem quickly emerged. When fitted, the new felt had to be lapped under the bottom two sets of tiles on the sloping roofs to create a waterproof seal. Usually it's just a case of lifting those tiles and refitting them after lapping in the felt. But the roofers found that the original tiles had been incorrectly fitted – probably when the new



extension was being built in the 1990s. To remove correctly fitted tiles, a special ripping instrument is used to take off the nail heads and the tiles then slide out. But because our tiles were double nailed it was not possible to remove the bottom rows without breaking the ones in the row above, which meant removing another row, which would also break, and so on. The solution offered was to remove *all the tiles* and re-roof these roof elevations correctly. The estimate for this extra work would have added £5,900 to the bill!

As this additional cost was way outside what we the hall trustees had budgeted for, other solutions were explored. Finally, the contractor agreed to cut out (rather than try and lift out) the necessary tiles and, after lapping in the new felt, create a waterproof seal with lead fixings. But before any tiles of this type and age may be cut, they first have to be checked for the presence of asbestos. And, yes, you've guessed it – ours were made from an asbestos/concrete composite. More delay and yet more expense! With additional time and some lateral thinking the company finally managed to remove the tiles, re-felt the roof and replace the broken, cut tiles with lead fixings. The final part of the exercise is the removal of the damaged ceilings in the kitchen and foyer, replacing the insulation and plasterboard, re-skimming and then decorating. As I write, this work is underway and being carried out by a local builder, Kevin Oliver.

AES Roofing have been very supportive all along the way by economically fixing the problems not of their making (charging us at cost) as well as paying for the interior work caused by the storm damage. Supporting local approved trades people has always served us well. And we also owe thanks to our own Parish Council who had previously agreed to give the Hall a grant towards the cost of the original repairs. Once again, that community spirit in times of adversity shines through. We're now watertight and cosy and look forward to welcoming you when lockdown eases.

Silver haired and stylish, Margaret was an independent, hospitable, generous, kind, sociable lady, of high integrity with a great sense of humour and a deep Christian faith. She will be much missed by all those who knew her in the village, by friends and her family of two children, five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren of whom she was so proud. Margaret was ready, though, to be re-united with John having had a fulfilling and faith-filled earthly life.

From the Alfrick & Lulsley Parish Council Meeting 28 January 2021

Financial Matters

The Parish Council has decided that the parish precept that is included within the local Council Tax will be the same as last year - £13k, which on average is - 72 pence/week per household. It had decided also that £10k could be used from the general account to augment the fund for the Children's Play Area Project.

The Virus Pandemic and Lock-down

Committee on New Public Facilities

We have received a very generous offer from the *Fox and Hounds* Lulsley of their play equipment as they will be removing it. Discussions have taken place about its suitability and how it could be incorporated into the total scheme.

Subsequently it was decided to carry forward this aspect to another meeting and proceed to install the *MUGA* (Multi-Use Games Area) on its own to get the project moving. This led to an application to MHDC being made on 21 January for £56,032 and we have heard this has been accepted. More news later once the contract starting date is agreed.

Enhancing Biodiversity on Parish Council Land

As you may have seen, things have been happening on the playing field! The ditches have been cleared out, the tarmac near the lane gate no longer floods in heavy rain, making access easier and thanks to our enthusiastic band of volunteers, new native mixed hedges have been planted, supplied free of charge by the *Woodland Trust*. All the work should result in some reduction to the water logging. Thanks to *Western Power* some trees along the hedge now look very odd; we're giving them time to recover before pruning to a better shape.

A professional arboriculturist has carried out a safety inspection on all the Parish Council trees, especially the ash. Some limited felling and

branch trimming will be done. We will keep a close eye on the big ash trees for dieback (*Hymenoscyphus fraxineus*); the Forestry Commission is keen that if not dangerous, large iconic trees such as these aren't felled immediately even if in an early stage of the disease. Some ash trees will recover and cuttings from them will be important for growing on new young resistant trees.

The lockdowns and restrictions as well as poor weather have meant, frustratingly, that working parties in the Spinney have been intermittent this season and non-existent at Alfrick Pound. The field fencing in the Spinney has been replaced and a new gate installed. The path has progressed well and we hope that the few planted snowdrops will flourish.

COVID-19 permitting, more working parties will be organised during the spring. Volunteers will be very welcome; do contact Carol and Derek (01886 884372/mobile 07929 091814 or carol.bradley372@hotmail.com).

Speeding through the Village

The latest data from the Radar Camera shows that some 50% of all traffic passing the Lulsley and Stocks Road camera locations was over the 30mph limit and 38% by Swan Orchard. Speeds recorded at all locations showed averages of around 36mph but the incidence of speeds of over 50mph has reduced. The highest speed recorded was at the Old Police Station on Stocks Road - over 60mph twice at 16:30 on 6 November.

At the January council meeting a group of parishioners raised the matter of the behaviour of four-wheel-drive vehicle enthusiasts on the un-maintained public road Sandy Lane. This has caused serious damage during the recent wet weather and the late night visits and associated noise are antisocial to say the least. **Road Closed** signs have now been placed at both ends of this road. This should allow WCC Highways to assess the damage and reinstate the roadway to its previous state which followed some substantial restructuring and fencing (all now destroyed) about two years ago.

The council is supporting residents where it can in their efforts to resolve these problems.



1) Did You Know: Cashew Nuts Aren't Really Nuts?

Over half of the world's **cashew** new **production** is concentrated in just three countries: Vietnam, India, and the Ivory Coast. The industry in each country, however, is marked by dangerous conditions and poverty-line wages for workers.

Cashew nuts come from fruit producing trees. The fruit, or 'cashew apple', which resembles a bell pepper, is what is called a 'false fruit'. The real fruit dangles from the bottom of the cashew apple, guarding within it a single seed, known to us as a cashew nut. *To see a picture, for copyright reasons just Google cashew; you'll be amazed!*

The most difficult step in how cashew nuts are processed is extracting the kidney-bean-shaped nut from its shell, which is labour intensive and requires a skilled workforce - 90% of whom are women and paid negligible wages. When cracked open, the shell oozes highly corrosive oil referred to as CNSL or 'cashew nut shell liquid'. This oil, when in contact with skin, causes burns and sores which often present health risks for workers.

The cashew nut industry also has significant social value, providing vital employment to millions of people, especially women. A combination of cashew nut farming, processing and exporting can create employment for local farmers and communities all year round.

So

2) Suckley Church has chosen to support Toilet Twinning in Ivory Coast, where Cashew nuts grow.

More than half of all schools have no toilet or water point. Ivory Coast remains one of the poorest countries in the world: about 40 per cent of its population lives below the poverty line. Up to a third of people in rural areas do not have safe, clean water to drink, so water-borne diseases are rife.

The Hill Trust

Most people will know Suckley Village Hall and, indeed, probably have been inside from time to time. Fewer people will know about the Hill Trust. This is a charity set up to run the Hall and the trustees and committee members include the vicar, representatives from the PCC and PC.

In 1908 Suckley Working Men's Club and Parish Room was completed on land provided by Edward Henry Hill, the son of Worcester MP, Thomas Rowley Hill. This building included a main hall, a committee room, a kitchen and outside toilet blocks. Adjoining the Hall was the caretaker's house, with rooms for a nurse. In total the land extended to approximately 1,570 yards.

The purpose of the Club was to provide education and recreation for the members and by providing a nurse, the sick poor would also benefit.

In April 1911, Squire Hill, as he was known, died, and in his Will bequeathed to the Trustees of his Will "the Suckley Parish Room and Working Men's Club at Suckley, in the County of Worcester, recently erected by him, with land occupied therewith at his death and all furniture and other contents of the said Club..."

The trustees were charged with over-seeing the everyday running and maintenance of the buildings, appointing the caretaker, who was paid a wage and given the house to live in. There was a nurse who held her clinics in the community room, also paid by the trust, and many a child from Suckley School would have been marched down the lane to the Hall to have heads examined for nits. There was also a lending library which contained books and magazines.

Over the years many groups have used the Hall – from drama (the stage was removed in 1959 suffering from woodworm), the Pony Club, Alfrick Young Farmers, Suckley WI, to name but a few.

The Working men's Club suspended activities in 1955 and subsequent to this, the charity became known as the Hill Trust and was

regulated by a plan of the Charity Commissioners, which continues to this day. In 1962, the Hall won "Best Kept Village Hall" in Worcestershire. At this time, the trustees realized that a car park was needed, but, despite attempts to find suitable available land to buy or lease, no car park materialised until decades later – the one now in use and owned by the housing association. By 1982, the trustees wished to update facilities by building inside toilets, a new kitchen and community room. In order to fund this extension, the caretaker's house ("Hill View") was sold in 1984 into private ownership. The last caretaker left the house in 1983. The old community room and the outside gents' toilet and fuel store were incorporated into the now private property. The outside ladies toilet is still used by the Hall as a storage shed. Since 1955, three schemes have been explored with the view to re-locating the Village Hall but all have fallen by the wayside. The layout of the Village Hall remains much the same as it was in 1984 and the Hill Trust continues to care for the Hall, and welcomes hiring groups, friends and supporters through its door. Looking back through the Minutes of the Hill Trust from 1955 onwards, I can say that we modern day trustees face many of the same challenges as former trustees did, but with perhaps a little less of the woodworm!!

A Different Pandemic, Twenty Years Ago

"We come to kill all your animal tomorrow."

That is what a Spanish technician phoned us to say at 6.00pm one night, deep into the crisis. This week (mid February 2001) it's twenty years on since the start of the monumental terror that was foot and mouth. Items on local radio today brought back tears to my eyes even after all this time.

A bit like this current lockdown, we became used to not seeing friends, not being able to go anywhere and being worried continuously for months.

Our herd of Hereford cross cattle were very precious to us, having bred them all except Henry the Hereford bull. One cow had given birth to live triplets, which we were told is a 1 in 40,000 chance. Well, Speedy, Weedy and Greedy all survived amazingly, and over the next dozen years each of those three had nine single calves and one set of twins. A real family dynasty. We may be rather sad farmers in that we gave names to most of the other cattle too. (Their compulsory ear tags seemed impersonal.) We knew them all so well.

To be told by an unknown foreign person, not even our own vet, that he was coming to kill them all next day was devastating. Our life's work to go up in flames, literally, after being shot. No sleep at all that night. Next morning we waited and waited in great trepidation for the killing crew to pitch up, but no-one came. Eventually we phoned (useless) MAFF/DEFRA regarding the tissue samples they had taken a few days previously.

"Oh those, they came back normal a couple of days ago" another foreign person told us in a very offhand manner. Our relief was intense, but I'm afraid anger came to us as well, as we felt badly done-by. The exact same thing happened to other farming friends, and to us again two weeks later, very draining and upsetting, but we were fortunate in the end that our stock survived.

We had smoke drifting over the farm from the burning pyres in Whitbourne. The closest actual outbreak was on a neighbouring farm 500 yards away. Night after night from January to late August the news had heartbreaking pictures of the millions of cattle and sheep being burned on fires made from railway sleepers and straw. Devon and Cumbria had the worst times with thousands of families' livelihoods being cruelly destroyed. The children crying as their pet lambs and new-born calves were shot was especially sad.

The affected farms then had to be cleaned after the massacres. Gangs on very big money got drafted in supposedly to disinfect and steam clean the buildings, concrete yards etc. Many a large fortune was made in that way, but often the job wasn't done properly. We felt they were vultures, and it should be the farmers who received those generous sums to clean their own premises, not the folks having a jolly time squirting each other with pressure washers. Having no stock to feed and care for after the cull, it would have given the farmers some purpose in work. After a lifetime of doing animal chores seven days a week, suddenly having silent yards and fields left many to rethink their future. We continued with our cattle until the even worse and ever ongoing bovine TB meant the end of our herd, but that is a different story.

There were a few good aspects of the foot and mouth crisis which again is like our 21st century pandemic. People became more caring of their friends and neighbours. Also, in the case of 2001, farmers in general who normally got a bad press, (you never see a farmer on a bike etc.) received sympathy from the rest of the community. The Farm Crisis Network (FCN) and the Agricultural Chaplaincy became prevalent, and did sterling work helping desperate farmers with physical and mental problems. Even twenty years ago devastating mental effects were hardly talked about; thank goodness we do that a little more easily nowadays.

As with this virus situation we are in now, there are many unanswered questions from twenty years ago.

We wonder how many animals actually had the disease, as at least 95% were killed in a 'contiguous cull.' We wonder if MAFF/DEFRA handled it all sensibly?

We also wonder if 'young Mr Blair' wanted farmers to survive or not, as he was so keen on importing meat and milk from Europe. Articles in the farming press mentioned that merchants selling straw and railway sleepers had been contacted six months before the first fires were lit, to check on their stocks in case (?) they would be needed.

Political and personal thoughts collide sometimes, but we came through those tough times, and hopefully will get through the present one.


COVID Corner

The good news is that, by the time you read this, the most vulnerable groups will have been vaccinated with at least one dose. The “Real World” impact of the vaccine, even one dose, has been most encouraging in terms of its ability to prevent severe disease. The reduction in numbers needing to go into hospital should enable the current lockdown to be eased soon. The important thing to remember if you have been vaccinated is that there is a three week delay before it really becomes fully effective, and it gives little protection in the first two weeks. Even after vaccination you can still get a milder form of COVID-19 and pass it on to others, although to a lesser extent.

There are many challenges ahead. The first is the large number of people who believe controversy theories about the vaccine and are refusing to have the jab. (I have to say it feels a bit like those who refused to wear seat belts when they first came in, and who were willing to risk injury or death because of false assumptions.) The science is unequivocally clear that the benefit of the vaccines is so huge that everyone who can should have one. Unfortunately, it is those more vulnerable in ethnic minority groups who are more likely to refuse. This will not only cause many of those who refuse the jab to find themselves with severe illness, but it will continue to put a strain on the hospital services who desperately need to have a chance to catch up with the usual work they do, and take well deserved time off.

The second challenge will be the new variants, and the risks of reduced protection from vaccines in the future. At the moment our current vaccines protect us from severe disease from the known variants, but the rapid rise in these variants and the mutations that they carry mean that we cannot be complacent, and we really will not know for a long time whether the vaccines we are getting now will continue to protect us in the future. One factor to consider here is that the new mutations, which could cause our vaccines to become ineffective, are likely to occur in low-income countries where few of their

population have been vaccinated. COVAX and other initiatives to enable those countries to receive a fair share of vaccines are the only way to keep us all safe. Currently the degree of vaccine inequality is astounding, with two thirds of doses having been given to the richest nations which only represent 16% of the global population. For every dose in a low-income country the wealthiest nations have given twenty-three. Some countries have purchased enough vaccine to vaccinate their population four times over.



Everyone wants to be able to look into a crystal ball and know when we are going to be able to lead a ‘normal’ life. There are too many unknowns to answer that at the moment, and probably the question needs to be “what will the new normal be like?” From all I read my best guess is that little by little we will slowly get back to more normal life, but for the foreseeable future the virus will be with us and having an impact on our lives. I think it would be unwise to plan an overseas summer holiday at the moment because that is dependent on the situation in the country you plan to visit. Face coverings may become the ‘new normal’ in public indoor spaces. There is also evidence to show that like the ‘flu, this virus has a much higher attack rate in the winter. So, after a relatively good period over the summer what happens over next winter will be critical. That in turn will depend on having as many people vaccinated as possible and to finding ways to overcome anti-vaxxers. But for the first time since the start of this pandemic I see green shoots of optimism.


